Equitable Licensing of Research Results – Exploring Opportunities and Hindrances

30.Sept. – 1.Oct. 2010, Carl von Ossietzky Universität Oldenburg

The workshop aims to discuss modern licensing concepts amongst relevant stakeholders from life sciences, pharmaceutical industries, technology transfer and innovation policy. The results of a two years research project on equitable licensing will be presented and lessons learnt from various stakeholder perspectives will be discussed. Opportunities and hindrances in the context of licensing, cooperative research and product development partnerships, both for the national and the European level, will be analysed.

Equitable Licensing is a new approach aiming at making publicly funded research results available to those who can not afford to pay for them. The approach was first introduced for bilateral technology transfer relevant for medical treatments, especially for HIV/AIDS and neglected tropical diseases, on the African continent, but has expanded towards global health priorities and towards public private partnerships.

The workshop offers an opportunity for key experts and opinion leader from multiple disciplines for fruitful exchange under Chatham-House Rules and acts as a think tank for policy makers.

The event language is English and participants are expected to attend for the whole time.
